Membership Guidance per WA Salmon Coalition Lead Entity Reference Guide

Citizens Committees may include local residents and representatives of local, state, federal and tribal governments; community groups; environmental and fisheries groups; conservation districts; and industry.

The Citizens Committee is critical to ensure that priorities and projects have the necessary community support for success. Citizens Committee members often are the best judges of the community's social, cultural, and economic values and of how to increase support for salmon recovery over time through the implementation of projects.

Notes:

- 1) Recommend limiting size to 9-13
- 2) The state has no "formula" for composition of membership.
- 3) A review of lead entities shows great diversity in types of membership.
- 4) In instances where a project sponsor (e.g.—an entity requesting funds) is also on the technical committee and/or citizens committee, the standard practice is to recuse themselves from voting or participating in review.
